1452 - 1519

Leonardo da Vinci is considered the most ingenious person of all time. He's known mostly for his paintings, but also pursued sculpture, engineering, anatomy, botany, mathematics, physics, and philosophy. His personal journals contain many of his observations and drafts, for example his findings on human anatomy or outlines for technological inventions.

Mona Lisa

Owing to his varied interests, Leonardo da Vinci failed to finish a lot of his paintings. Those he did finish include a worldrenowned portrait of a woman. It's called Mona Lisa or La Gioconda and was painted on poplar wood with oil paints. Today, the painting can be seen at the Louvre Museum in Paris. When it was stolen from Louvre and found two years later, its popularity skyrocketed.



Renaissance

The Renaissance is what we call the historic period which started in the 14th and ended in the 16th century. Many European cities and royal courts saw arts and education boom, especially those in Italy. The term "renaissance" means rebirth. The then artists were inspired by the ancient Greece and Rome. The period peaked with Leonardo da Vinci and his work.

Orville 1871 - 1948 Wilbur 1867 - 1912

Orville and Wilbur Wright are considered to be the pioneers of aviation. In USA, they first developed an unpowered glider. Later, they constructed a wooden biplane covered in cloth, and finally took a flight in the very first powered aircraft. The two also founded a company that produced airplanes, called The Wright Company.

The first flight

In 1903 in North Carolina, USA, Orville Wright flew a powered airplane heavier than air for the very first time in history. The plane stayed in the air for 12 seconds in total and covered 37 meters. The same day, Wilbur flew 300 meters in the exact same aircraft.



History of aviation

In 1783, the very first hot-air balloon flight took place, orchestrated by the Montgolfier brothers. In 1852, Henri Giffard presented the world with the very first dirigible. More than one hundred years later, the Wright brothers managed to wrench an aircraft from the ground, even though it was heavier than air. In 1909, Louis Blériot flew across the English Channel, and in 1927, Charles Lindbergh made it across the Atlantic Ocean. Over the next 20 years, planes broke the sound speed limit.



Education

1889 - 1977

Chaplin was one of the most renowned filmmakers in history. He came up with ideas for movies, write screenplays, direct them, and cast himself as the lead. His childhood wasn't very happy; his mother suffered from a mental illness and his father died soon after. Chaplin and his brother ended up in an orphanage. When he was very little, he left with an English troupe for the USA. Later in Hollywood, he began making silent slapstick comedies which made him famous.

Cinema

Charlie Chaplin made his debut on the silver screen in a move called Making a Living. Over time, his silent shorts became very popular. The main character of Charlie the Tramp underwent a significant development, reflecting contemporary social changes. It's especially apparent in The Kid, City Lights, Modern Times, or The Great Dictator where Chaplin parodied the German Nazi regime. In 1971, Chaplin received an Academy award for his life's work and contribution to the global cinema.



Charlie the Tramp

In 1912, Chaplin first introduced the character of Charlie the Tramp. Back then, it was the most famous comedic character

in existence. He wore a tiny moustache, bowler hat, bamboo walking stick, huge shoes, and baggy trousers. Chaplin played the soft-hearted tramp for more than 20 years, up until the sound film era began.



Rehabilitation

1915 - 1963

Édith Piaf was a French singer, born in the suburbs of Paris. She had a difficult childhood, living by turns with her relatives and father with whom she trouped all over France. Her singing career started when she was singing to people in the streets. That's where a nightclub owner later discovered her. He gave her the nickname "sparrow", probably because of her small stature, and recommended her to wear a black dress while performing. The dress went on to become her signature garment. Her songs were about love and joy, but also about her hardships-both her little daughter and partner died, and she went through a string of failed relationships.

Songs

Édith became popular during WWII and after. She toured all over Europe, the USA, and South America. Her biggest hits are Non, je ne regrette rien, Mon Dieu, or Padam...Padam...



Chanson

Ever since the Middle Ages, the term "chanson" had referred to simple songs with merry, sometimes even satirical lyrics. Its modern form was born at the stages of French vaudevilles. The style of lyrics changed as well—they began resembling elaborate poems. Apart from Édith Piaf, Charles Aznavour, Jacques Brel, or Gilbert Bécaud also were chanson singers.
